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Q&A with Larry Ossei-Mensah

Co-curator of Unmasking Masculinity for the 21st Century

This is your first visit to Kalamazoo. Where are you from originally?

New York City, born and raised in the Bronx.

You just got back from London curating a show. How does Kalamazoo compare?

Kalamazoo has its own unique personality. Where I've been staying, I have a bird's-eye view of the city and you can see how much greenery is here, and with these spaces to explore, walk around, rest, hike, spend time with friends and family - that's what makes it a very unique place and experience. There are so many parts of this country that I think people should take the time out to visit. I think particularly if you're living on the coast, you really don't understand what makes Western Michigan unique and special. There are a lot of incredible, creative people from this part of the country. It's always great to see those things that inspire the creative process and make them who they are.

Is the KIA unique?

Definitely, because it's an encyclopedic museum. Most cities the size of Kalamazoo would tend to just have

a contemporary museum, so to see permanent work from antiquity to the present is a unique opportunity, it's honestly a gift to the city that I hope people take advantage of.

What would be one thing that you challenge us to see and to learn in *Unmasking Masculinity*?

One thing I challenge people to hopefully see is to see themselves in some shape or form in the exhibition. Regardless of how you identify, I think you will see various aspects of what makes us human. I think the different challenges we all struggle with are

in terms of getting a better understanding of self, our role in our community, and our role in society. It's an opportunity to look at yourself, and ask yourself, what can I do as an individual to make my community better? We are not trying to present all the answers but we want to get people talking and thinking.

COLLECTION HIGHLIGHT – Judith Rothschild

Born 1921, New York, NY | Died 1993, New York, NY

Judith Rothschild came of age as an artist in New York during the 1940s and was influenced by European avant-garde movements and artists like Fernand Léger. Throughout her career, Rothschild struggled to reconcile her figurative and abstract works. While a proponent of abstraction, she also believed that Abstract Expressionists and artists like Piet Mondrian removed too much from art and that the work was impersonal and distanced from the human experience. Rothschild questioned how art could "say anything meaningful about life when it avoids all traces of life as corporeally experienced."

The artist experienced success early in her career. Still Life was painted just three years after her first solo show in 1945 at the Jane Street Gallery in New York City. With its tightly composed geometric abstraction and a title that gives definition to the scene, this painting demonstrates the balancing act she worked to achieve. Rothschild created abstract imagery in which the tangible subject could be identified. Here, viewers can make out the shapes of a lemon and lime, fruits that are certainly standard in many still life compositions. Rothschild was determined to set her own path to artistic success. She worked in New York during the heyday of the male-dominated Abstract Expressionists, and rejected much of their stylistic approach. Rothschild moved to California, where she reconciled the figurative with the abstract in her own bold, fervid manner, And while her European and Cubist-inspired forms might seem commonplace today, in the 1940s and 50s they were innovative and a fresh take on longstanding art historical traditions like landscapes and still lifes.

Rothschild studied art at Cranbrook Academy in Bloomfield Hills and at the Art Students League in New York City. In 1945, she was accepted into the prestigious American Abstract Artists organization. Rothschild was committed to bettering her fellow artists and was involved in many art organizations. She served as the trustee of the American Federation of Arts, the Fine Arts Work Center in Provincetown, MA, and the New York Studio School, and on several museum committees. Her work is included in the collections of the National Gallery of Art, Washington, D.C., the Whitney Museum of American Art, and the Phillips Collection.

Art, Music & Feminism in the 1950s

JANUARY 21 - MAY 7, 2023

Art, Music & Feminism in the 1950s features only women artists working during this unique decade in American history and the world. In the 1950s, the post-war economic boom was in full swing. Employment for women was on the rise, yet many women who had taken jobs left vacant by men fighting in World War II returned to their lives at home, and marriage rates increased. The 1950s were a complicated period of change for women. Their discontent and resulting actions contributed to the social tumultuousness of the 1960s. Leaning against social, racial, and economic barriers, women helped reshape our society in meaningful ways with lasting progress.

This exhibition focuses on the art and music produced by women of the era and shows how their personal passions inspired new prospects for women artists in subsequent decades. Some of the visual artists hold true to American figurative traditions, while others venture deep into abstraction. Individually and collectively, their voices are powerful testaments to the uniqueness of the moment.

Using works from the KIA collection and loans from museums and private collectors, four themes will guide visitors through the exhibition. The first, "Her View of the World," explores Social Realism of the 1950s and art that reveals distinct perspectives establishing their voices in the art world. It examines the works of pioneering artists such as Marion Greenwood and Lola Alvarez Bravo. Both women were exceptional among their generation for the breadth of

their insightful representation of racially and ethnically diverse communities. Second, "The Canvas Ceiling" addresses obstacles to women in the art world. By discussing race and gender, this section brings forward the work of Mary Abbott, Perle Fine, Olga Albizu, and others; all were well known in certain art circles, yet overlooked regarding exhibition opportunities and reviews. "Sheroes," examines the trailblazers who modeled excellence for artists and women in future decades, either by their art or by the freedom in which they lived their lives. Diverse artists, such as Georgia O'Keeffe, Lois Mailou Jones, Ruth Asawa and Helen Frankenthaler, brought deeply personal perspectives to art-making, changing the art of their time with innovative painting techniques and subjects. Finally, "She's Making a Comeback" presents rarely seen works by artists such as Catherine Hinkle and Maybelle Richardson Stamper. These regionally known artists (and some largely unknown) during the 1950s are being re-discovered and explored for their inventive ideas.

Art, Music, & Feminism in the 1950s uncovers some of the often-underestimated influences of women by exploring issues regarding gender roles, identity, and personal freedoms. The presentation reveals how women artists of the 1950s played a pivotal role in opening new pathways for women in the 1960s and beyond. The experience is layered with insights into women's impacts on 1950s literature and music.

Unmasking Masculinity for the 21st Century

SEPTEMBER 24 - DECEMBER 29, 2022


Juxtaposing works from the KIA's collection and those borrowed from private and public lenders around the U.S., *Unmasking Masculinity for the 21st Century* investigates how artists use tradition, contemporary practice, and performance to explore the construction of masculinity. Co-curated by Rehema Barber, Chief Curator of the KIA, and highly acclaimed independent curator Larry Ossei-Mensah, the exhibition is also a forum to engage the community in conversations led by artists, scholars, and activists.

This exhibition presents diverse communities and individuals, while also revealing how artists such as Kehinde Wiley, Kahlil Joseph, and Jaishri Abichandani, among others have responded to, reframed, or reclaimed the concept of masculinity throughout the 20th and 21st centuries. This unique exhibition uses five key themes: Coming of Age, Performing Bodies & Identities, Representation & Belonging, Sports & Masculinity, and Power, Privilege & Perspectives to explore a multitude of viewpoints surrounding masculinity during the last five decades. Unmasking Masculinity questions established ideas of manhood and investigates how these ideas continue to influence understandings of masculine identities today. Overall, Unmasking Masculinity illuminates the complexities of manhood in our society, while encouraging visitors to consider new ways of thinking about masculinity. As a result, new pathways of being, seeing, and talking about identity for future generations become evident.

Along with an extensive schedule of programming, a full-color catalog will accompany *Unmasking Masculinity* for the 21st Century with contributions from the curators, Jeff Chang, Omar Lopez-Chahoud, Paul Robert Solomon, Anuradha Vikram, and Maurice Wallace.

Captive Beauties: Depictions of Women in Late Imperial China

OCTOBER 15, 2022 - JANUARY 15, 2023

Depictions of the female figure have been an important element in Chinese art for centuries. During the Qing dynasty (1644-1911) these images included depictions of members of court, mothers, allegorical beauties, fictional characters from opera, literature, poetry, and theater. Women from Imperial China were often depicted in terms of their highly regulated lives, which were entirely dependent upon men. In some paintings, women engage in duties according to their socioeconomic status based on patriarchal Confucian principles. Other paintings show women with elaborate coiffures and silk dresses, serving as musicians or courtesans. Literary and visual artists often compared women's physical attributes to flowers, depicting them as refined, delicate, and otherworldly.

Organized by the Minneapolis Institute of Arts (Mia) and curated by Dr. Yang Liu, *Captive Beauties: Depictions of Women in Late Imperial China* explores the longstanding tradition of portraying women in Chinese art during this unique era. The works show the traditions of highlighting the physical beauties of the sitters for the enjoyment of the viewer and as symbols of idealized behavior, trends, and cultural norms.

Captive Beauties is an opportunity for the Kalamazoo community to engage with some of the best examples of Chinese painting from the Qing Dynasty (1644-1911) in the United States. Dr. Yang Liu joined Mia in 2011 and oversees one of the finest collections of Chinese art outside China itself. He heads the museum's Department of Asian Art, a wide-ranging collection of art from diverse cultures. A native of Zhejiang province near Hangzhou, the provincial capital and one of China's most scenic cities, he briefly taught as the senior lecturer at the Beijing International Studies University before studying for his PhD in Chinese art history and archaeology at the University of London's School of Oriental and African Studies.

Expressions in Paper and Clay

JANUARY 28 - MAY, 14, 2023

Expressions in Paper and Clay will show the vibrant, engaging, and innovative traditions of Japanese printmaking and ceramics spanning the last fifty years. Expressions in Paper and Clay juxtaposes contemporary prints by Japanese artists on loan from Joy and Timothy Light with a newly promised gift of contemporary ceramics by Japanese artists from the Carol and Jeffrey Horvitz Collection. This exhibition explores how abstract and realistic concepts come to fruition using these disparate media.

Artists featured in this exhibition include potter Yoshitaka Tsurara and renowned abstract printmaker Toko Shinodo, among others. Tsurura creates minimalist landscapes on refined monochromatic vessels. Mayumi Oda composes meticulous and imaginative images. The luminous and dynamic surfaces of Ken Matsuzaki's oribe glazeware are energetic and colorful. Reika Iwami's textured and embossed woodblock prints express strong geometry. Iguchi Daisuke's highly regarded refined forms reveal subtle exteriors. Naoko Matsubara's lively compositions that frequently reference Buddhist traditions and holy sites, along with the bold rinpa inspired sculptures of Takuo Nakamura reveal the intersection of tradition and innovation.

Expressions in Paper and Clay continues the Kalamazoo Institute of Arts' long-standing commitment to presenting art and techniques that intersect with disciplines taught in the Kirk Newman Art School, while illuminating Japanese innovations in art for the community.

Plantation Politics and the Ripple Effect on Black Fatherhood

First established in 2015 by a group of fathers in Kalamazoo, MI, the Fatherhood Network (FHN) is a support group that is aimed at strengthening family relationships



before, during, and after the child rearing process. Kevin Lavender Jr., the Executive Director of FHN, has a deep passion and commitment to supporting fathers and coordinating opportunities for dads to build community amongst each other while connecting with community resources. His hope is that fathers feel encouraged and supported in their role as a father. Lavender will share information about the mission of the Fatherhood Network, and will examine the socialization of Black masculinity and fatherhood starting from West Africa, pre-slavery, to the 21st century.



Captive Beauties: Depictions of Women in Late Imperial China

Dr. Liu Yang, Chair of Asian Art and Curator of Chinese Art at the Minneapolis Institute of Art, is the organizing curator of Captive Beauties: Depictions of Women in Late Imperial China. Dr. Liu will share insights into the key ideas behind the exhibition such as why artists chose to depict the lives of women when their status was so dependent on their relationship to men. Dr. Liu will also explore the hairstyles and clothing seen in these artworks, as well as the floral symbolism so closely tied to the physical attributes of women in Late Imperial China.


Captive Beauties: Gender Practices and Depictions of Women in Late Imperial China

November 15, 12:00 pm (2)



Dr. Leihua Weng discusses the women exhibited in Captive Beauties. She will describe the activities the women in the paintings are engaged in, acknowledging the social and cultural norms related to the lives of women and gender practices in Late Imperial China. This talk also discusses how some gender practices were reformed or abolished at the turn of the 19th and 20th centuries in China. Dr. Weng is the Chinese Endowed Assistant Professor of Chinese Language and Literature at Kalamazoo College. She completed her Ph.D. in Comparative Literature. She is interested in various topics on tradition(s), including their formation, transmission, and transformation.





Making and Unmaking of Masculinities since the 1960s with Dr. Scott Melzer

November 22, 12:00 pm (2)



What does it mean to be a man? Definitions of manhood and characteristics of masculinity have always been as diverse as the people and groups with whom they are associated. Since the sweeping cultural and political changes of the 1960s, dominant versions have been challenged and a wide diversity of masculinities have gained greater representation, visibility, and appeal. Racial, ethnic, class, gender, sexuality, ability, age, citizenship, and other forms of diversity shape contemporary masculinities. From adolescence through adulthood, identity to status, relationships to politics, sports to war, breadwinning to caretaking, performances to power, violence to nonviolence, privileges to inequities, and social changes to backlash, gender matters. In this talk, Dr. Scott Melzer, the W.W. Diehl Trustees' Professor of Sociology and Chair of Women's, Gender, and Sexuality Studies at Albion College, will explore how these developments have impacted various people, groups, and communities in a North American context.
