C. C. Wang: Lines of Abstraction is an exquisite culmination of the extraordinary artistic career of Wang (Wang Chi-ch'ien 王己千 or Wang Jiqian, 1907-2003), which was, at times, overshadowed by his reputation as a connoisseur and collector of pre-modern Chinese art. The Wang family collection was exhibited at The Metropolitan Museum of Art in New York in 1999. The exhibition on view at the KIA, organized by Hunter College, highlights Wang's ability to fuse his admiration of and regard for the Chinese masters into his modern creations using new ideas, transformative materials, and redefining Chinese ink painting.

The KIA will also host the first U.S. solo exhibition of works by contemporary Chinese artist Wu Jian'an. A Bridge Between Two Worlds: Works by Wu Jian'an, features the artist's intricately cut paper works, ink paintings, and abstract sculptures. His layering of visual images, energetic lines, and symbols are modern reenvisionings of Chinese art forms having 2,000-year-old origins. This exciting and unique artist pays homage to Chinese folklore through innovative shapes and structures, weaving narratives from the past and present together into unexpected and sophisticated compositions.

Many outstanding programs are available for almost every possible interest at the KIA. We invite you to experience a robust offering of lectures, book discussions, and special events. KIA programs reflect a deep commitment to uplifting the community through the arts. We hope to see you soon as we usher in another gorgeous fall in Kalamazoo.




COLLECTION HIGHLIGHT

Born in 1905, Shang-yi Wang was a contemporary Chinese artist whose works included both landscapes and calligraphy, two traditional Chinese art forms.

This is one of Wang's calligraphic works. In China, the practices of painting and calligraphy developed simultaneously but were not regarded with the same prestige until the Song Dynasty (960-1279). Calligraphy was the dominant form of artistic expression for the majority of early Chinese history and shows the beauty, power, and simple expression of the word. The Chinese language is particularly expressive, because each sign is logographic, or depicting a word, and the meaning of each symbol can be somewhat ambiguous. This ambiguity leaves room for both artistic expression and interpretation. Calligraphy is done almost exclusively in black ink, with a brush. The Chinese characters in this untitled piece read "Kalamazoo Art Center," along with the artist's signature. Shang-yi Wang, who passed away in 1972 at the age of 67, instilled a love of art in his son, longtime Kalamazoo resident Dr. Paul Wang. Dr. Wang, an artist and art collector, has work in the Kalamazoo Institute of Art's permanent collection as well. This piece represents the larger purpose of the Kalamazoo Institute of Arts: to form a place that represents the backgrounds of artists from around the world, and to shed light on the cultural significance and importance of visual art forms globally.

NOW ON VIEW THROUGH SEPTEMBER 24, 2023

The KIA's longstanding history of celebrating the artists and artistic practices of East Asia continues with *Sugoi!* A two-part presentation — *Sugoi! Japan in Video* and *Sugoi! 200 Years of Japanese Art* — These exciting exhibitions use select loans and the KIA's permanent collection to illuminate the ways in which Japanese and Japanese American artists have depicted society and their environments, challenged artistic and societal conventions, innovated long-standing artistic practices, and explored new media.

Sugoi! Japan in Video: 1966-1994 represents video works from five pioneering artists. In Waiting for Commercials, Nam June Paik collaborated with experimental filmmaker Jud Yalkut using Japanese commercials and humor to explore Japan's changing pop culture. Similarly, Takahiko Iimura employs humor through language, creating a commentary on multiculturalism. Rock Video: Cherry Blossom, by Shigeko Kubota, explores the fleeting nature of life and memory through cherry blossoms and video. Mako Idemitsu's Great Mother (Harumi) questions societal norms in Japan and the challenges women face. These artists used emerging technologies of their time to push the boundaries of artistic practices, cementing a pathway for video and digital media as a form of Contemporary Art.

Sugoi! 200 Years of Japanese Art features over 40 works of art from the early 1800s to 2022. Artists like Hiroshige Ando illustrated city life. Whereas, Hokusai's and Utagawa's works convey the impact of Japanese theater on modes of social entertainment, historical events, and fables. Akira Kurosaki's and Haku Maki's abstract compositions feature bold colors and dynamic lines, alluding to the world around us. Roger Shimomura, Tomokazu Matsuyama, and Oishi Sakaya present contemporary explorations of society and innovative approaches to their chosen media.

These exhibitions showcase exceptional and innovative artistic expressions stemming from Japanese culture over the last two centuries, underscoring art's power to communicate humanity's desire for connection, resilience, and progress.

Sugoi! Japan in Video is on view in the Joy Light Gallery of Asian Art through September 3 and Sugoi! 200 Years of Japanese Art can be viewed in the main-level galleries through September 24.

A Bridge Between Two Worlds: Works by Wu Jian'an

SEPTEMBER 16 - DECEMBER 31, 2023

A Bridge Between Two Worlds: Works by Wu Jian'an is the first major museum exhibition in the United States featuring the artist's incredibly meticulous work. Operating across a variety of media, Wu Jian'an is a unique figure in the contemporary Chinese art world. Although the artist's primary medium is cut paper, over the course of his career, he has expanded his practice to include working in painting and sculpture. The exhibition features a variety of objects demonstrating the artist's creative evolution over two decades. Frequently, the artist's complex and multi-layered compositions include thousands of elements that reference contemporary, mythological, and obscure folklore. Wu Jian'an work has been referred to as a hybrid of past and future, figure and abstraction, and tradition and innovation.

Wu Jian'an was born in Beijing in 1980. He received his Bachelor of Arts degree from Beijing Broadcasting Institute in 2002. In 2005, he earned a Master's degree in Fine Art at Central Academy of Fine Arts (CAFA), then joined the faculty of CAFA. Wu Jian'an's works can be found in museums, including the Museum of Fine Arts, Boston, Los Angeles County, Museum of Art, and Herbert F. Johnson Museum of Art, Cornell University.

C. C. Wang: Lines of Abstraction

SEPTEMBER 16 - DECEMBER 31, 2023

Born to a family of scholar-officials at the twilight of the Qing dynasty, C. C. Wang (Wang Jiqian 王己千, 1907–2003) mastered the traditional ink and brush techniques in Republican Shanghai and immigrated to New York City in 1949. There he sought to preserve the tradition of classical Chinese painting through engagement with new ideas, materials, and forms. Drawing inspiration from past masters in the history of Chinese painting, as well as New York's artistic climate in the wake of World War II, Wang advanced breakthrough transformations in ink painting.

C. C. Wang is best known as a preeminent twentieth-century connoisseur and collector of premodern Chinese art, a reputation that often overshadows his own artistic achievements. Held 20 years after the artist's death, *C. C. Wang: Lines of Abstraction* recenters Wang's extraordinary career on his own artistic practice to reveal an original quest for tradition and innovation in the global twentieth century. Spanning seven decades, the exhibition focuses on the artist's distinctive synthesis of Chinese ink painting and American postwar abstraction.

C. C. Wang: Lines of Abstraction is organized by Hunter College Art Galleries and curated by Dr. Wen-shing Chou and Dr. Daniel M. Greenberg with Hans Hofmann Graduate Curatorial Fellow Margaret Liu Clinton. It was developed through a two-semester curatorial seminar led by Professor Wen-shing Chou with MA Art History students Thais Bignardi-Engstrom, Carolyn Bishop, Rawls Bolton, Jeremy Gloster, Sophie Kaufman, Emerald Lucas, Lindsey Poremba, and Mia Ye.

The Marukis: Their Paintings, and Their Peace Activism in Postwar Japan

August 8, 12:00pm (2)



Iri and Toshi Maruki are known for their huge murals depicting the aftermath of the 1945 bombing of Hiroshima. At first, their paintings focused on the horrors caused by the atomic bomb. From the 1970s on, their focus changed, and their paintings began to include other victims of war violence. Dr. Takashi Yoshida discusses the work of these two artists, addressing how and why their art changed over time. In addition to the Marukis, Dr. Yoshida's presentation briefly analyzes pacifist movements among Japanese artists and the role of museums in postwar Japan.

Dr. Takashi Yoshida is a Professor of History at Western Michigan University. His publications include From Cultures of War to Cultures of Peace: War and Peace Museums in Japan, China, and South Korea (2014) and The Making of the "Rape of Nanking": History and Memory in Japan, China, and the United States (2006).

West Michigan Area Show Artist Highlight

The Photography of Gordon Parks, Renaissance Man

Gordon Parks was one of the 20th century's premier photographers and photojournalists. His work was marked by a keen artistic eye as well as a deep sense of compassion for his subjects. These qualities are on full display in many of his works, including the photograph American Gothic, Washington, D.C., which is part of the KIA's permanent collection. Parks was also a noted author, film director, composer, and painter. Parks' achievements are all the more remarkable when contextualized against the poverty and racism that he faced during his early life. This ARTbreak talk will focus on examples of Parks' photography as well as on highlights of the fascinating life of this Renaissance man.

Sam Grossman is a docent at the KIA, as well as a former darkroom photographer. He is a retired pediatrician and former teacher.

Art and Social Justice

September 5, 12:00pm (2)



Emily Williams (she/her/hers) joined the Kalamazoo College community as Executive Director of the Arcus Center for Social Justice Leadership in the fall of 2022. During this ARTbreak, we explore the ways that Williams and the Arcus Center have used art to catalyze action, foster empathy, and inspire activism.

Williams has worked with organizations and community stakeholders to further social justice, equity, and inclusion in more than 20 countries, including on a global treaty adopted by the United Nations. For more than a decade, she has worked professionally on local and global levels to create an equitable world by centering those who are most marginalized. As Senior Program Officer at the Solidarity Center, she collaborated with global labor organizations to promote inclusive development, and to advocate for human rights and gender equality. In 2014, she co-founded the Social Justice Initiative at the University of Illinois at Chicago, where she built the center from the ground up. The Center's programming highlighted the interconnections of race, gender, class, and other systems as a critical foundation for work and action to advance social justice. Williams holds an MA in Women's and Gender Studies from DePaul University and a BA in Psychology from Beloit College.



Explorations in Print with Trevor Grabill

Trevor Grabill is a printmaker and teacher in Kalamazoo, and an instructor at the Kirk Newman Art School. Their woodblock and linocut prints depict the strangeness, beauty, and sadness of small towns and natural spaces in the Upper Midwest. They are fascinated by gardens, bus stops, side streets, parking lots, front porches, and other spaces that are simultaneously banal and magical. During this ARTbreak, Grabill offers a closer look into their artistic inspiration and process.



Borrowed Light, Homage to My Father

Margaret Vega is a Professor Emerita of Kendall College of Art and Design, where she taught painting, drawing, color theory, and concept design. Her work has been shown widely across the United States and abroad, including exhibitions in Rome, Shanghai, Munich, New York, Chicago, and San Francisco. Vega is also the

Founding Director of SiteStudio, an organization that brings maker experiences to children within their own communities.

In 2022, Vega created an ofrenda at the Grand Rapids Public Museum to honor her late father, Francisco Miguel Lopez Tapia Nava Vega, an activist who fought for Latinos' civil rights alongside Cesar Chavez, advised U.S. presidents from John F. Kennedy to George H. W. Bush, and created the first National Scholarship Association for Latino Students. During this ARTbreak, Vega shares insights into the design and selection process involved in making an ofrenda with traditional and historical artifacts.



How the Teatro Olimpico and the Drottningholm Slottsteater "Perform" their Pasts


Is it possible for audiences to be transported to the theatrical past? Dr. Ed Menta joins us to explore this question and more, taking a closer look into the history and architectural design of the Teatro Olimpico (Vicenza) and the Drottningholm Slottsteater (Stockholm). His talk will analyze how these theatres "perform" their pasts, examining how their distinctive features employ motion and space; the presence of their silent ghost audiences; their similarities as one-room theatres; the "democratic nature" of their auditoriums; and the use of trompe l'oeil in their construction. From 1986-2018, Professor Emeritus Ed Menta taught Directing, Theatre History, and Playwriting at Kalamazoo College, directing/producing more than 100 plays for the college's Festival Playhouse. Menta's articles have appeared in multiple journals, including Theatre Topics, Theatre Research International, Shakespeare Bulletin, and The Baseball Research Journal. He is also the cofounder, composer, and guitarist of the Kalamazoo blues band, BlueBack,

Engaging with Modern Dance

Marisa Bianan, a 2018 graduate of Western Michigan University's Dance program (BFA), was named the Associate Artistic Director of Kalamazoo's own Wellspring/Cori Terry & Dancers in 2021. She has presented choreographic works at the 2019 Midwest RADFest, Inaside Chicago Dance's Summer 2020 concert, and the 2021 Maggie Allesee Choreography competition. Recently, she was commissioned to create a new work, which premiered in February 2022, for Western Michigan's First Year Performance class. She was also selected to participate in the 2023 Detroit Dance City Festival's Choreographers

Showcase. During this ARTBreak talk, Bianan discusses how to observe, engage with, process, and analyze modern dance. In addition to offering tips for viewing modern dance, Bianan includes insights into her own choreographic process, as well as a discussion of important elements of choreographic theory.

Witches, Devils, Goblins, and Other Images of Halloween

October 31, 12:00pm (2)



Halloween in the 21st century is a fun day, associated with youth, dressing up in costumes, and trick-or-treating, evoking images of witches, devils, and goblins that are more entertaining than macabre. Halloween has its origins as a pre-Christian Celtic festival that appropriated elements of and converged with the religious feasts of All Saints' Day and All Souls' Day, which solemnly commemorate saints, martyrs, and the dead. This Halloween, Dr. James Palmitessa joins us for a talk on the origins of popular Halloween imagery and traditions, analyzing images of witches and devils that arose



during the European witch hunts of the 15th-18th centuries C.E., including woodcuts by famous artists such as Albrecht Dürer and Hans Baldung Grien. Dr. Palmitessa also explains Halloween's place in the traditional annual calendar of popular and religious festivities, highlighting its similarities to, and differences from, various Carnival traditions of Europe and the Americas, as well as All Souls' Day festivities in Mexico and Latin America.

Dr. Palmitessa is an Associate Professor of History at Western Michigan University, specializing in European history in the Late Middle Ages and Early Modern period, where he teaches a course on the Great European Witch-Hunt.

The Art of Making, from Thought to Process

August 24, 6:00pm (2)



Artist Mami Kato, whose striking sculpture Umbilical Field is part of the Sugoi! 200 Years of Japanese Art exhibition, joins us to offer insights into her artistic inspiration and her process of creation.

Kato is a Japanese-born artist, currently based in Philadelphia. Her older work is about examining and reconnecting with her early life. For example, she has often used rice stalks as a material for her sculpture, something that has both a close connection to her childhood surroundings, and also a historical significance and symbolic meaning within Japanese culture. More recently, Kato's focus has been shifting from her own personal life to more general human experience. Influenced both by Japanese Buddhism and science, she explores the intangible systems of energy and order that pervade the natural world, as well as humanity's position within them.

Kato graduated from Musashino Art University and Tokyo School of Art in Japan and the University of the Arts in Philadelphia. Since relocating from Tokyo to the United States in

1992, she has been showing actively both in the U.S. and abroad. Her work has been exhibited in galleries, art fairs, and museums worldwide, and she has works in private, corporate, and museum collections, including the Philadelphia Museum of Art.

Exploring Popular Culture in Japan

Interested in learning more about Japanese popular culture? During this ARTful Evening, we embark on an exploration with Dr. Brian White!

An Assistant Professor of Japanese at Kalamazoo College, Dr. White teaches courses on Japanese language, literature, and popular culture. In his research, he has examined the history of science fiction in Japan, asking how authors in the 1960s used the fledgling genre as a tool to navigate the complicated political conditions of the Cold War. His current research on Japanese analog games examines how board games and tabletop role-playing games have shaped the genre of high fantasy in Japan and thus have served as a crucial, but often overlooked, influence on the much larger industries of video games and anime, from



Final Fantasy to isekai. Guiding all of these concerns is an abiding interest in the ways that our popular media help us articulate and even create — our identities on the personal, national, and trans-national levels.

Weight and Whimsy: **Chinese Language in Contemporary Art**

October 12, 6:00pm (2) \$10 nonmembers/\$5 members

The most distinctive feature of Chinese visual culture is the written language. Chinese people gave up robes for Western suits, Mao jackets, and jeans. Hutong houses are being replaced with steel and glass towers. But the written language is impervious to Westernization. Dr. Alfreda Murck will discuss four contemporary artists — Wang Fangyu, Qiu Zhijie, Zhang Huan, and Xu Bing - who feature Chinese characters in their art. Their works are not calligraphy per se, but are rather critical and witty commentaries on politics, culture, China's long history, and on the language itself.

Dr. Murck holds a Ph.D. in Art History from Princeton University. Her research centers on classical Chinese painting. An internationally recognized curator, educator, and scholar, she has served in key positions in both the Metropolitan Museum of Art and the Palace Museum in Beijing, and she has also taught Chinese art history at Columbia University.


