In 1924, the Kalamazoo Institute of Arts began as an art center and school established by the Kalamazoo Chapter of the American Federation of the Arts. The 1930s saw the introduction of visual arts classes to the museum. Kirk Newman arrived in the 1940s, establishing art education as a vital part of our community, in the school that would later bear his name. The 1950s originated the Clothesline Art Fair, now known as the annual KIA Arts Fair, making it one of the first of its kind in the county, pre-dating the Ann Arbor Art Fair by seven years. The 1960s brought the museum into the building we occupy today, inspired by the visionary Mies van der Rohe, a pillar of midcentury architecture.

The next five decades fashioned the KIA of today: a space where the arts are for everyone in a museum and school that provide inspiration, fulfillment, and transformation to all who enter. With our collection of more than 5,000 objects to the 300 classes offered yearly in the Kirk Newman Art School, the KIA empowers our West Michigan community as well as those from across the world to delight in the visual arts.

As you can see, much has changed in the past century here at the KIA. We hope you will play a big part in maintaining this era-spanning legacy as we advance into our centennial year. Everyone who has visited us holds a concrete memory of the KIA's power in their lives: a class in the Kirk Newman Art School; a jaw-dropping exhibition in one of our 10 galleries; a handmade gift purchased in the KIA gallery shop; a milestone event held in our iconic building. These shared moments make *you* a part of KIA history.



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

West Michigan Area Show Call for Entries



Applications for the 2024 West Michigan Area Show close on March 3, 2024. Local artists from 14 West Michigan counties can now submit their art for a chance to be juried into the 2024 West Michigan Area Show. More than \$6,000 will be awarded and entries can range from paintings, prints, and photos to mosaics, ceramics, jewelry, sculpture, and mixed-media works. The 2024 West Michigan Area Show will be on view from May 3 to August 25, 2024.

This year's juror will be gallerist Jessica Silverman. Jessica Silverman is an ambitious, innovative, and internationally renowned gallery that builds artists' careers and supports art buyers keen on establishing noteworthy collections. The eponymous gallery was founded in 2008 after Silverman had completed an MA in Curatorial Practice at the California College of the Arts, after a BFA from Otis College. The gallery represents artists who make museum-worthy art at all stages of their careers. Works by the gallery's artists have been acquired by museums such as the Tate (London), Reina Sofia (Madrid), MoMA (New York), the Whitney Museum of American Arti, MCA Chicago, Art Institute of Chicago, and many others.

COLLECTION HIGHLIGHT

Born in 1939 in Queens, New York, Jane Lund attended the Pratt Institute, Queens College, and the New York School of Social Research. Lund's vibrantly colored and meticulous pastels are meditative and incredibly realistic. The nature of Lund's practice is painstaking — one work can take almost a year to complete. Rather than drawing from direct observations, Lund prefers to create intimate portraits from numerous photographs and studies.

Rendered in the hyper-realist style for which she is best known, Portrait of a Scholar depicts an elegant woman staring outward toward viewers. This approach, from the positioning of the sitter to her expression, is typical of Lund's practice. However, this seemingly somber demeanor does not allude to the sitter's character. Instead, Lund relies on traditional portraiture tactics - props and attire — to provide further clues about this scholar. Wearing large hoop earrings, the woman holds a book in her left hand while bracelets adorn her right wrist. Her deep blue tunic bears ornate shifting designs around the sleeves and collar. A larger hexagonal patterned prism fills the center of the caftan and connects to the patterns trailing below it and across the woman's chest. Lund combines aspects of adornment and emotion to suggest her subject's complex nature. Furthermore, by not using the person's name as the title for the work, Lund challenges viewers' understanding of who a scholar is and what they might look like.

The subject is Dr. Eileen Julien, who became Lund's friend when they were Bunting Institute Fellows in the Radcliffe College at Harvard University from 1985 through 1986. A Professor Emeritus of Comparative Literature, French, and Italian in the College of Arts and Sciences at Indiana University Bloomington, Julien's research spanned African and American literature and oral traditions. Says Julien, "In the African context, I have been especially interested in the perceived tension between being 'modern' and being 'ourselves' and what this implies for understanding the relationship between 'indigenous' or 'local' resources..." Lund's creation of life-like compositions like Portrait of a Scholar are homages to her close friends and relatives.

EXHIBITIONS American Realism: Visions of America, 1900-1950

CLOSES APRIL 14, 2024

The closing of the 19th century and the first decades of the 20th century saw massive changes in the American art scene, as artists, still heavily influenced by Western European art centers, began to aggressively seek to define a new "American art." Fueled by trade, industry, and immigration, New York grew into a dominant international city, easily rivaling its European counterparts as a hub of finance and culture. Artists responded to this transformative period with explorations of the changing social scene and growing urban landscape, resulting in a revolutionary time for American art.


American Realism: Visions of America, 1900-1950 looks at this period through the paintings, drawings, and prints that sought to capture the new American experience, especially within the nation's burgeoning and rapidly evolving urban centers. Drawing primarily from the collections of three Michigan museums — the Kalamazoo Institute of Arts, Flint Institute of Arts, and the Muskegon Museum of Art — the show begins in the early 1900s and continues through the 1940s, highlighting artists whose work sought to define the era. The exhibition also explores the contributions of women and artists of color active during this period, to share a deeper look into the stories and lives of those who did not always receive widespread attention during that era. *American Realism* will feature the works of artists such as Robert Henri, George Bellows, Jacob Lawrence, Guy Pene du Bois, Edward Hopper, Reginald Marsh, Hughie Lee-Smith, and many others, including Michigan artists who too sought to define and document the changing ways of living that they saw around them.

Kyungmi Shin: A Story to Finding Us

CLOSES MAY 12, 2024

Kyungmi Shin: A Story to Finding Us continues the artist's explorations of the historical narratives embedded in painting and ceramic practices flowing between the East and West. For this unique exhibition, Shin selected works from the Kalamazoo Institute of Arts' Chinese ceramics collection. Her investigations explore the historical, cultural, and global implications surrounding the commercialization, distribution, and subsequent appropriation of Chinese designs and techniques (chinoiserie). By contrasting these objects with her collaged paintings and chinoiserie-inspired creations, Shin expands upon her previous bodies of work that challenge prevailing narratives about colonization, global economic practices, identity, and immigration.

The artist uses her works to assert the importance of recounting and celebrating stories that represent the perseverance of the Asian Diaspora. *Kyungmi Shin: A Story to Finding Us* recognizes the difficulties that emerge as a result of searching for one's personal and cultural histories. Yet, it also reveals that such an enterprise is, ultimately, a journey of self-exploration, transformation, and resilience.



During this ArtBreak, learn more about Kalamazoo poet, playwright, and mixed media artist Denise Miller (they/she). Miller's poetry has been published in The Offing, African American Review, and Blackberry: A Magazine. They were named the 2015 Willow Books Emerging Poet, an AROHO Waves Discussion Fellowship awardee, a finalist for the Barbara Deming Money for Women Fund, and a Hedgebrook Fellow. Their book Core was released by Willow Books in 2015 and was nominated for a 2016 American Book Award and a 2016 Pushcart Prize. Their chapbook, Ligatures, was published in 2016 by Rattle Press, and, most recently, they won the 2020 Sexton Prize for Poetry for their full-length poetry collection, A Ligature for Black Bodies.

Miller's chapbook *How to Make an American Mass Shooter* is forthcoming through Querencia Press. Their produced plays include *Ligatures* (adapted for the stage) and *Before the Shooting.* Their work has been recognized with a number of prestigious fellowships and residencies across the U.S., including, most recently, a 2023 Renaissance House Fellowship.

Ginger Owen-Murakami will discuss her path to the creation of new work — *Girl's Own Guide*, a series of wet plate collodion images and mixed media collages. This work amalgamates themes of honoring history and familial nostalgia.

Owen-Murakami is Professor of Photography at the Gwen Frostic School of Art, Western Michigan University in Kalamazoo, MI. She holds an MFA in Photography from Louisiana State University and a BFA in Photography from The University of Central Florida. Owen's artwork derives imagery from narratives and themes of family history, race, gender, and culture. Her interdisciplinary practices include installation, sculpture, digital, traditional, and non-silver photographic processes. She has lectured, worked, and exhibited internationally.

The Obliterating Whiteness of the Ashcan Circle and U.S. Visual Culture

February 20, 12:00pm 🔁

The Ashcan Circle, perhaps more so than any other collection of U.S. modernist artists, is almost synonymous with the notion of realism: urban, gender, classed, labored, ethnic, and yes, even racial realism specifically. Yet what can it mean that the dialogues of this most "real" visual production have been quiet to serious engagement with Blackness? In this virtual ArtBreak talk, Dr. Alexis L. Boylan considers that the implications of realism have been weaponized in Ashcan art and U.S. visual culture, in order to silence and disperse Blackness with an obliterating obsession with whiteness.



Dr. Boylan is a professor with a joint appointment in the Art and Art History Department and the Africana Studies Institute at the University of Connecticut. She is the author of *Visual Culture* (MIT Press, 2020) and *Ashcan Art, Whiteness, and the Unspectacular Man* (Bloomsbury Academic, 2017).

Listen, Feel, Imagine: Discovering Nuestra Tierra through Musical and Somatic Research

RADicle Residency is a collaborative nature-based residency between Wellspring/ Cori Terry and Dancers' RAD Fest program and The Croft of Horton Bay, MI. Each year, a selected dance artist creates a work at The Croft in the fall, and that work premieres in Kalamazoo at RAD Fest in March.

This year's RADicle artist is Amanda Ramirez (she/her), a Chicago-based dancer, movement director, and choreographer who creates genre-bending performance works centered around her Chicana culture. Ramirez is a graduate of Texas Tech

University and has performed professionally across the country in the fields of theatre, modern-contemporary dance, improvisation, Latin dance, salsa, and flamenco.

Since 2016, Ramirez has presented original choreographic works throughout the Midwest, at Links Hall, Loyola University, College of Lake County, The Croft, and more. She has directed, choreographed and produced several evening-length shows. Her latest, *Nuestra Tierra*, will premiere at this year's Rad Fest. She is currently in post-production for her first dance film, *Tierra*, which she directed, produced, and choreographed.

Weaving as Metaphor, Liminal Spaces, and Other Interdisciplinary Interconnections

Victoria Marcetti (they/them), also known as Lïmen Creative, is a Queer and neurodiverse interdisciplinary artist and youth development worker living, working, and creating on the land of the Council of the Three Fires, or so-called Kalamazoo, Michigan.

Approaching creativity and artmaking as a vehicle for processing knowledge and as a therapeutic modality, Victoria explores and



contemplates the social responsibilities of the artist in their immediate communities and the world at large.

With a glimpse into their artistic practice, Victoria will share their view of weaving as a metaphor for interconnection, and will celebrate the rich opportunities for connection and understanding afforded to us when we create together.

Women Activists in Comics: Creating Change through Image and Text

Activism is a burgeoning subject in graphic novels, with many social movements across the globe inspiring comics renditions in fiction, non-fiction, and fantasy. This talk will delve into the reasons that comics is a powerful medium for depicting and discussing activism and the many women who are using it to call attention to human rights issues, document resistance, challenge harmful ideologies, and create change in the real world.

Krista M. Turner (she/her) is a PhD candidate in the Department of English at Western Michigan University. Her work focuses on geopolitical and social conflict, war, and civil resistance in graphic narratives.





Mideast/Midwest: A Brief Introduction to Middle Eastern Music



During this ArtBreak, presented in collaboration with the Kalamazoo Symphony Orchestra, Dr. Beau Bothwell will offer an overview of Middle Eastern music and a glimpse into the performance of Middle Eastern music in Kalamazoo.

Bothwell is Associate Professor of Music at Kalamazoo College, where he teaches courses in ethnomusicology, music theory, and music history. He received his PhD in musicology from Columbia University, focusing on music and radio in Syria and Lebanon. He also holds BAs in Ethnomusicology and Music History from UCLA, where he began studying oud in the Near East Ensemble under Ali Jihad Racy. Bothwell has taught at Columbia, the Juilliard School, the American University in Beirut, and the New School. He has published on various topics related to music in the U.S. and the Arabophone Middle East. Bothwell is currently president of the Michigan Festival of Sacred Music, which presents the Connecting Chords Music Festival every year, and is past chair of the Society for Arab Music Research.

Laughter is the Best Medicine: Humor in Art

April 2, 12:00pm

Humor has many beneficial effects. It is clinically proven to have a powerful impact on physical, emotional, and social well-being. Understanding the humor of a given culture can also help to define its values and beliefs. The advent of readily accessible — and inexpensive — printing techniques facilitated the widespread expression of humor in the visual arts. Since the late nineteenth century, several art movements, such as surrealism and funk art, have incorporated humor. The postmodern period of the late 1960s to the present has contributed a wealth of humor to the visual arts, expressed through outlets ranging from traditional media to memes.

Jim Carter is a retired physician who had a clinical practice of Internal Medicine in Kalamazoo for 36 years, also serving as an Associate Professor for Michigan State University College of Human Medicine and Program Director of Internal Medicine for MSU-Kalamazoo Center Medical Studies. He has been involved with the KIA for over four decades as a photography student, board member, board president, and docent. His major area of interest is the intersection of art with medicine.

Building Safe Spaces

Dell Darnell (they/them) is the founder of The Dapper Hammer and is a carpenter and woodworking educator. Darnell started The Dapper Hammer, Michigan's first trans-owned teaching workshop, several years ago to chase a dream of supporting the community with their hands, building beautiful things, and sharing their passion of teaching people who are not traditionally represented in the trades — including girls, youth, women, trans, and non-binary folks. Darnell loves the energy and empowerment that comes from a space designed for inclusivity and diversity — especially when it's a niche that has historically been exclusive of so many.

When they are not swinging a hammer, Darnell is the Director of Services for OutFront Kalamazoo and oversees all DEI training, two housing programs, and all mental, physical, and social health services.

Darnell holds a master's degree in International Non-Profit Administration from Western Michigan University and has been the recipient of several awards for their work advancing the movement for justice and equality for the LGBTQ+ community.



Wonder of China: Blue and White Porcelain

April 30, 12:00pm 🙆

Join us for a screening of "Blue and White Porcelain," an episode from the documentary series *Wonder of China.* Learn more about the history of the iconic blue-on-white ceramic style that has been admired, collected, and copied for centuries. Follow artists Lu Lyujun, Ye Jianxin, and Liao Zhidan as they demonstrate their own approaches to this art form, drawing from both centuries-old traditional methods and contemporary innovations. The episode concludes with a consideration of the classic art form in unconventional artistic settings, such as architectural design and fashion.

The *Wonder of China* series was produced by the China Broad View Cultural Communication Center in Beijing. This episode runs for 30 minutes and is captioned in English. Following the screening, stop by the Joy Light Gallery to view the blue and white porcelain pieces featured in the exhibition *Kyungmi Shin: A Story to Finding Us.* Selected by Shin, these works from the KIA's permanent collection are thoughtfully displayed in conversation with her own collaged paintings and ceramics.

Not Yet: An Artist's Oeuvre

February 8, 6:00pm

For ceramicist Suze Lindsay, every step in the making process is engaging, and she enjoys experimenting with form and function. Working with stoneware clay, Lindsay subtly suggests figure and character by manipulating forms after they are thrown. An integral part of her work includes surface

decoration, enhancing her pottery forms by patterning and painting slips and glazes for salt firing. Her mark-making is strongly influenced by her study of historical ceramic practices from cultures in Japan, Crete, Chile, China, and Native North America.

Lindsay's formal ceramic studies started with a two-year Core fellowship at Penland School of Craft, followed by an MFA at Louisiana State University. She returned to Penland as a long-term artist in residence before setting up a studio in Penland's rich craft community with her husband and fellow potter, Kent McLaughlin. Lindsay owns and operates Fork Mountain Pottery in the mountains of western North Carolina.

American Art between the World Wars: Race and the Realist Impulse with Carmenita Higginbotham

During this Artful Evening, presented in conjunction with the exhibition *American Realism: Visions of America, 1900-1950*, Dr. Carmenita Higginbotham offers an analysis of race and representation in the Realist art of the 1920s and 30s. Higginbotham's research examines 20th-century American art,



and how notions of "the city" have had an impact on representation. She has lectured extensively on the history of American art, popular visual culture, and public art, and has served as a featured scholar and consultant on the topic of Walt Disney and the Disney corporation's cultural impact. At present, Higginbotham is Dean of Virginia Commonwealth University's School of the Arts.

Prior to her current role, Higginbotham served as department chair of the University of Virginia Department of Art, and as assistant and associate professor in the departments of Art and American Studies. She received her PhD in the History of Art from the University of Michigan.



Mythology and History April 25, 6:00pm

Learn more from the artist whose captivating works are featured in the Joy Light Gallery exhibition *Kyungmi Shin: A Story to Finding Us.* Los Angeles-based artist Kyungmi Shin (b. 1963, Busan, South Korea) works in the fields of painting, sculpture, and photography. Using her own family archive and painting historical and cultural narratives in juxtaposition, she places marginalized bodies at the center of her work, creating artworks that shift the gaze from dominant narratives to immigrant, creolized, and complex stories.

Shin received her MFA from UC Berkeley in 1995. Her works have been exhibited at the J. Paul Getty Museum, the Berkeley Art Museum, the Sonje Art Museum, the Japanese American National Art Museum, and the Torrance Art Museum. She has received numerous grants, including the California Community Foundation Grant, the Durfee Grant, the Pasadena City Individual Artist Fellowship, and the Los Angeles Cultural Affairs Artist in Residence Grant. Her artwork is included in the collections of the J. Paul Getty Museum, LACMA, and BAMPFA.

"Hogan-Minded": Race and Place in Georgia O'Keeffe's Southwest April 11, 6:00pm

A native of the DC area and a graduate of Bowdoin College, James Denison recently completed his PhD in Art History at the University of Michigan. During the summer of 2023, he joined the KIA and Kalamazoo College as the Postdoctoral Curatorial Fellow.



In a talk drawing on his dissertation research, Denison will argue that past interpretations of Georgia O'Keeffe's New Mexican paintings have obscured her engagement with Southwestern Indigenous cultures. He will highlight the influence of tourist contexts and period racial thinking on her work, describing how it relied upon and perpetuated romantic stereotypes about those cultures circulating within interwar New Mexico and the Manhattan avant-garde. Ultimately, her paintings and writings make clear that she saw the region much as countless others had before: as both deeply informed by the presence and history of its Native peoples and as open, empty, and ripe for claiming.

This Artful Evening is presented jointly by the KIA and Kalamazoo College. The lecture is free, but preregistration is encouraged!






