


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Staff Highlights



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COLLECTION HIGHLIGHT

In honor of the KIA's partnership with Art Bridges and the Crystal Bridges Museum of American Art in Bentonville, Arkansas, which brought several works by Native American artists, including two paintings by Fritz Scholder to the KIA through June 2025, Scholder's Indian with beaded sash from the KIA's collection will also be on view this fall. Born in Breckenridge, Minnesota in 1937, Fritz Scholder was an artist who initially eschewed painting the Native American experience. An early student of Oscar Howe, a notable artist of Yanktonai Dakota descent, Scholder then went on to study with Wayne Thiebaud at Sacramento State University. Other artists such as Francis Bacon, Leonard Baskin, and Willem de Kooning influenced Scholder's artistic practice. It was not until he began teaching at the Institute of American Indian Arts (IAIA) in 1964 that Scholder created his first paintings of Native Americans in response to the lack of representation of contemporary Native American lifestyles.

Scholder's dynamic compositions featuring bold colors and expressive brushwork that blended figurative, abstraction, and Pop Art brought him mainstream recognition. By 1969, the artist left the IAIA to pursue a full-time career as an artist. At that time, he expanded his practice to include photography, printmaking, and sculpture. A 1970 invitation to the Tamarind Institute printshop introduced him to printmaking and resulted in a 14-year partnership. Indian with beaded sash is one of those series of prints created during his years working with Tamarind. Portraits like this were controversial within and outside the Native American community, with some seeing his depictions of Native peoples as reifying European and American ideals of Native American life. Regardless, Scholder's paintings subverted Native American stereotypes such as "the noble savage," and instead shed light

on the lasting traumas and daily realities affecting Native Americans such as alcoholism, displacement, and unemployment.

As he was one-fourth Luiseno and German, Sholder did not consider himself "fully Native." Scholder created images that critiqued Western and non-Native ideas of Native Americans. He embraced the paradox of emotions his works instilled and saw them as a way to draw people in. An irony especially, in light of this depiction of his *Indian with beaded sash*, which at first glance could be perceived as a stereotype of an Indian persona. However, portraits like these

are larger-than-life representations of Native people; perhaps, alluding to society's inability to comprehend and appreciate Native American contributions and experiences fully. Although Scholder received wide national acclaim, he did not want to be considered a proponent of the New American Indian Art Movement. Nonetheless, Scholder influenced generations of young Native American artists. In 1980, Scholder stopped painting Native American portraits and life, instead focusing on depicting his travels and other interests such as mythology, death, and the afterlife until he died in 2008.

Clearly Indigenous: Native Visions Reimagined in Glass is a first-of-its-kind exhibition. giving broader and overdue recognition to a wide range of contemporary Native American and indigenous, Pacific-Rim artists working in glass. The importance, rarity, and excellence of this milestone event are not to be missed. Clearly Indigenous includes over 100 glassworks created by twenty-nine Native American artists and four Pacific Rim artists from New Zealand and Australia, along with selections from leading glass artist Dale Chihuly who was a part of a collaboration between the Rhode Island School of Design (RISD) and Institute of American Indian Arts (IAIA) which resulted in establishing a glass program and a hot shop for the IAIA.

Due to the unique nature of this exhibition, beyond regular museum admission, there will be an additional cost of \$8 for adults and \$5 for youths, students, and senior citizens.

Timed ticketing will also be in effect throughout the duration of the exhibition. Members receive FREE *Clearly Indigenous* admission tickets based on their membership level. Reserve your tickets today!

Clearly Indigenous: Native Visions Reimagined in Glass was originated by The Museum of Indian Arts and Culture, Santa Fe, New Mexico. The traveling exhibit was curated by Dr. Letitia Chambers and is toured by International Arts & Artists.

Powerful Forces: Legends, Rituals, and Warriors in East Asian Art

SEPTEMBER 14, 2024 - JANUARY 19, 2025

Through depictions of quiet temples and sacred deities, ceremonial vessels and devoted priests, and the esteemed figures of scholars and samurai, *Powerful Forces: Legends, Rituals, and Warriors in East Asian Art* illuminates the profound themes of power and legend intrinsic to East Asian heritage.

Temples, deities, priests, and holy figures are far more than artistic subjects; they are emblems central to East Asian culture and their diverse societies. These depictions, crafted with imagination, detail, and reverence, symbolize the quest for spiritual harmony and the connection between the divine and the mundane. These sacred entities invite viewers to reflect on their enduring influence and spiritual significance.

Scholars and samurai offer insight into the intellectual and heroic dimensions of East Asian history and folklore. Scholars, often shown in tranquil settings of contemplation, represent the pursuit of knowledge, wisdom, and cultural refinement. Their depictions underscore the high esteem in which education and intellectual achievement are held. Conversely, the samurai, with their dynamic, yet disciplined stance symbolize ideals of honor, loyalty, and valor. Their portrayals evoke the complex interplay of peace and conflict, duty, and virtue.

Powerful Forces delves into the rich symbolism and mythology surrounding these divine and cultural figures, exploring the multifaceted dimensions of power and legend in East Asian art and culture. The exhibition invites viewers to contemplate the intricate relationships between spirituality, tradition, intellectual endeavors, and martial prowess that have shaped East Asian societies over centuries.

Richard Phillips: Strokes of Freedom

Detroit artist Richard Phillips' art is testimony to his ability to create beauty and find meaning in the most difficult times. A self-taught artist, Phillips started painting while in prison: landscapes, portraits of famous people, jazz musicians, and more, eventually creating over 400 paintings.

Arrested in 1971 for a murder he didn't commit, Phillips was in prison for 46 years. Creating art enabled him to persist and deal with the injustice of his situation. "I didn't actually think I'd ever be free again. This art is what I did to stay sane," Phillips said. "I could get off into one of my paintings and just be in there for hours." Today, collectors and viewers alike appreciate the beauty he created throughout those long decades.




the blockbuster exhibitions from our past.






While this is an insightful analysis of art, it ultimately becomes a meditation on how loneliness can foster creativity and lead to personal and artistic growth.




